

# The Chaplain writes for the AGM

Churches are full of the strangest people – a mix of races, colours, political opinions, ages and temperaments. It was always like that – and it's one of the things that makes church so wonderful. It makes for difficulties, as well of course, but that's only to be expected. Church should be a place where it is possible to be different and disagree and still love one another.

It's been like that since the earliest days. Think of the apostles, of course, and what a peculiar lot they were. They weren't always sure what was going on, and they weren't always happy with the way things were turning out.

The way they coped in those first Easter days while events unfolded around them was that they met together for prayer. The scattered followers, those who had run away, those who had given up, those who were afraid – they got back together and they met for prayer. And the form that prayer took would have been familiar to us. The

words of the prayer that Jesus taught them – bound up with prayers and psalms and hymns and all in the context of a supper, with bread and wine taking on a wonderful new meaning for them as they celebrated a Eucharist as he had told them to.

Already, things were coming together for the Easter people and they were finding strength and a new vision and purpose together. Well, some of them were. Things were still very shaky. Not everyone was always there. Thomas was one who missed out when Jesus made one of his Resurrection appearances.

And so he was rather “off” with the others when he came back. Unless I see for myself.

I think we can see more than a few parallels in what was going on: There is the core of disciples, regular and faithful, even when things are tough. Their shared experience carried them through, and for most, that shared experience of prayer and praise and

Eucharist was what made them Christians and brought them to Pentecost and the gift of the Spirit. It was this being together as church which laid the foundations for their apostleship.

But Thomas was a little different. He had missed out on something significant – we're not given the reason why – and seems a bit resentful when he comes back. But the important thing is that he does come back, is welcomed back, and he too then meets with the risen Christ.

Because that's what we're here for. The meeting with Christ. And whether as a group or as an individual, the experience has to be genuine. First and foremost it is about a meeting, or a series of meetings, with the risen Christ. We are an Easter people.

When we are gathered together, then we will meet with him. What we do here regularly, week by week is an authentic religious experience - a real meeting with God. There are no "off days". Each time the eucharist is offered here, some-one – perhaps the person

next to us, unbeknown to us – has a meeting with the risen Christ. Some-one's life may have been changed at half past seven on a wet Tuesday evening.

Given that we, for the most part, live ordinary lives, it is here that we will meet the risen Christ; it is here that he will bring us his joy, his comfort and his strength. But only when we recognise him. To be true disciples, we have to be faithful in the simple routine of meeting together, to hear about Christ, and to break bread and take wine as he commanded. This is the key to making our ordinary world hum with the extraordinary perspective of resurrection; of widening our horizons beyond self and time; and of making our ordinary world with all its everyday woes and disappointments bearable.

Which brings us to our Annual Parochial Meetings. What could be more of a contrast, and more ordinary than that? And yet, this speaks to us too of how so many of you have found and served Christ in this place. Without your care for this building and its worship, life in this community

and this city would be seriously diminished. And without your determination to keep the faith, the life of our archdeaconry and diocese would be one step nearer to a dull monochrome and all the poorer for it. You believe in the faith once delivered to the satins; and you believe in the promises of Jesus; you obey his command to do this, and without you, there would be no familiar, traditional Anglican church for anyone and everyone to call their own.

And so we come to the ordinary things. Like giving your collection, generously and regularly, week by week – that is so important. Paying the bills is always a real challenge. And of course there are other things, like cleaning and mending, singing, and serving, filling in forms and sitting on committees and struggling with figures; unblocking drains, polishing, cooking and washing up. Thank-you all for good, ordinary hard work over the past year. God loves you for it.

If we all really value what we have here; if in all this we meet the risen Christ, then Alleluia is our song

*Alleluia!*  
*Christ is risen!*

Alleluia is a shout of praise, pure and simple.

Perhaps we're not too good at being living alleluias. Have you looked at the faces of those around you sometimes? Not that you should all have silly evangelical grin, but really, we could all be a little more cheerful in the presence of the risen Christ. Remember the two disciples on the Emmaus road. Did our hearts not burn within us ... If there is anything that we might all work towards in this coming year it is to be more generous, yes, but also more joyful, more enthusiastic about the really good people we know here; about the wonderful things we share; about the wonderful meetings with the risen Christ we all experience. It's quite simple. That's how we meet Christ, and that's how we come to believe. Like Thomas.

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
